

OHSAA BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING MINUTES (June 11, 2026)

The Ohio High School Athletic Association Board of Directors held a regularly scheduled meeting on Thursday, June 11, 2026, at 7 17 Credit Union Park in Akron prior to the OHSAA State Baseball Tournament. President Stephanie Evans called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m. The meeting began with the Pledge of Allegiance and introductions of guests in attendance.

I. ADOPTION OF AGENDA

Motion by Jeff Wheeler, second by Tom Nerl to **adopt** the agenda as amended for the June 11, 2026, Board of Directors meeting.

Motion passed 9-0.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Motion by Ray Hibbs, second by John Carter to **approve** the minutes from the April 23, 2026, Board of Directors Meeting and the May 20, 2026, Board of Directors Special Virtual Meeting.

Motion passed 9-0.

III. FINANCIAL ITEMS

A. Recommendation to Approve the OHSAA Financial Report through May 31, 2026

Chief Financial Officer Laura Vermilya provided the financial report through May 31, 2026. She said that, while virtually none of the spring sports tournament reports have been submitted, she expects the net profit for the 2025-26 fiscal year to be approximately \$825,000 (the proposed budget expected a loss), and expenses to be five percent favorable to budget.

When combining cash and investments, the OHSAA's current total cash was at \$17.5 million, which would cover 8.7 months of expenses, and that is similar to where the Association stood a year ago. The financial report is summarized as follows:

B. Recommendation to Approve Athletic Enrichment Fund Donation for 2025-26 School Year

Chief Financial Officer Laura Vermilya said the Executive Director's Office recommended distributing \$1,250 to each member school for the 2025-26 fiscal year as a donation from the OHSAA's Athletic Enrichment Fund. Schools that return their membership cards and pay past due invoices by June 30 will receive a check from the OHSAA in August 2026.

Motion by Lane Warner, second by Mark Rose to **approve** the recommendation as presented.

Motion passed 9-0.

Note: In April 2023, the Board approved the establishment of the athletic enrichment fund for the purpose of providing a financial contribution, on an equitable basis, to each member high school's athletic department to assist with costs of equipment, uniforms, game transportation, officials and improving student sportsmanship and adult fan behavior. On an annual basis, the Board will determine whether to transfer money to the fund from operating cash and then decide the contribution amount to be provided - which may fluctuate each year - for each school. The donation was also \$1,250 in 2024-25.

IV. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Updates on Spring Sports Tournaments

OHSAA sport administrators provided brief updates to the Board on their respective spring sports tournaments. It was reported that all tournaments went well, including **boys tennis, boys volleyball, softball, track and field, boys lacrosse** and **girls lacrosse**. The state **baseball** tournament was about to begin while the Board of Directors Meeting was taking place. Of note, the OHSAA Jesse Owens State Track and Field Tournament expanded to five divisions from three for the first time and was held over four days rather than two. And Melvin Blake was recognized for his outstanding work again as the state softball tournament manager.

B. Review of OHSAA Athletic Discussion Meetings

Executive Director Doug Ute informed the Board that the six in-person OHSAA Athletic Discussion Meetings were completed and successful. The OHSAA is required by the Constitution to conduct these meetings in order to explain the upcoming referendum issues, so the majority of the meetings were spent with Director Ronald Sayers reviewing those items. Mr. Ute thanked Director Bob Goldring for organizing the meetings; the school administrators who attended, and Streetsboro, Clayton Northmont and Logan high schools that volunteered to host three of the meetings, which were also held at facilities in Cambridge, Tiffin and Westerville.

C. Review of 2026 Referendum Voting

Associate Executive Director Kristin Ronai said voting on the 12 OHSAA Referendum issues (one Constitution, 11 Bylaw; three of the issues for 7th-8th grade schools) took place between May 1 and 15, and all of the issues passed with the exception of the proposal that would have permitted students at OHSAA member public schools that do not offer a team sport to participate in that sport at another OHSAA member public school, with certain stipulations. The results can be found on the OHSAA website (www.ohsaa.org/School-Resources). Member school principals are required to vote but may abstain on any issue, and 803 of 815 high school principals voted and 562 of the 741 7th-8th grade principals voted.

D. Review of 2026 District Athletic Board Elections

Director Ronald Sayers said voting for the 16 expiring and unexpired/interim positions on the six OHSAA district athletic boards took place between May 1 and 15. He thanked fellow staff member Alexis Holderman for her work during the petition and voting processes. The results can be found on the OHSAA website (www.ohsaa.org/School-Resources).

E. Update on 2026 Fall Meetings

The OHSAA will again conduct Regional Update Meetings in August and September and Administrator Workshops in August. Regional Update Meetings are intended for superintendents, principals and athletic administrators and will consist of updates, reminders and a review of key changes from Executive Director Doug Ute and other staff members within the Association to kick off the 2026-27 school year. The two-hour meetings all begin at 10:00 and will be on the following dates and locations: **Monday, Aug. 31**, Waverly High School; **Tuesday, Sept. 1**, Westerville, Quest Conference Center; **Tuesday, Sept. 8**, Streetsboro High School; **Thursday, Sept. 10**, Liberty-Benton High School, Findlay; **Monday, Sept. 14**, Cambridge, Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center, and **Tuesday, Sept. 15**, Cincinnati Princeton High School.

The three Administrator Workshops are intended for first- or second-year school administrators and will review key OHSAA bylaws and regulations and provide various updates and reminders. Two of the workshops will be in-person at the OHSAA Office in Columbus and one will be virtual. All meetings will begin at 10:00 and will be on the following dates: **Tuesday, Aug. 4**, OHSAA Office; **Wednesday, Aug. 12**, OHSAA Office, and **Monday, Aug. 24**, Virtual. Registration information for all meetings will be sent to administrators later this summer.

F. Reminder on Board Resolution Cards

Staff member Alexis Holderman said the Executive Director's Office is still receiving Board Resolution Cards, which must be returned to the office by June 30 in order for schools to continue membership within the OHSAA and to confirm the requirement to follow OHSAA regulations. At last count, she said 27 of the 670 expected cards have yet to be submitted. Ms. Holderman said she will continue to follow up with schools that have not returned the card and will provide an update at the August 27 Board of Directors Meeting.

G. Update on Appeals, Legislative Issues and Legal Cases

Staff member Lizzy Wilson provided the Board with a list of schools that have recently violated OHSAA bylaws or sports regulations. **Toledo Start High School** had two student-athletes in boys track and field and boys basketball violate Bylaw 4-3-1, Enrollment and Attendance, when they participated in regular season contests without being enrolled in and attending the school full time. Further, the student did not meet the requirements of any of the enumerated exceptions codified within Bylaw 4-3-1. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the school was fined \$200 and they must forfeit all victorious contests in which the ineligible students participated. **Springfield High School** had a student-athlete violate General Sports Regulation 7.2.1 when he participated in a non-interscholastic contest after establishing himself as a member of the school's baseball program. The Executive Director's office accepted the school's self-imposed penalties of a one-game suspension. **Trenton Edgewood City School District** violated Bylaw 4-9-3, Recruiting Marketing, when the school posted a social media post promoting only the school district's athletic programs through a multi-stage marketing campaign that discussed other facets of offerings within the district. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the school district was fined \$500 and is hereby publicly reprimanded for this violation. **Amherst Steele High School** violated General Sports Regulation 7.3.1, 50 Percent Limitation, when more than three boys basketball players participated on the same non-interscholastic team. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the students are suspended for the first two games of the 2026-27 basketball season. **Pataskala Licking Heights High School's** junior varsity baseball coach violated General Sports Regulation 7.3.1, 50 Percent Limitation, when he permitted more than six baseball players to participate on the same non-interscholastic team. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the coach is prohibited from participating in the 13 summer day practices from May 15-July 31, 2026. **Dayton Chaminade Julianne High School** had a student-athlete in girls track and field violate Bylaw 4-7-2, Transfer, when she participated in a contest during the period of ineligibility required within the transfer bylaw. In accordance with Bylaw 10-2-5, Forfeitures, the school forfeited the victorious contest in which the ineligible student participated. **Duncan Falls Philo High School** had a student-athlete violate General Sports Regulation 7.2.1 when she participated in a non-interscholastic contest after establishing herself as a member of the school's softball program. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the student-athlete was suspended for one regular season contest. **Convoy Crestview Middle School** had a student-athlete violate General Sports Regulation 7.2.1 when he participated in a non-interscholastic contest after establishing himself as a member of the school's baseball program. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the student-athlete was suspended for several regular season contests. **Sebring McKinley Middle School** had a student-athlete in 7th-grade boys basketball and track and field violate Bylaw 4-3-4, Semesters, when the student competed in his third and fourth semesters during the 2024-25 season. In accordance with Bylaw 10-2-1, Forfeitures, the school forfeited the victorious contest in which the ineligible student participated. **Delaware Hayes High School's** junior varsity boys lacrosse team violated Boys Lacrosse Regulation B.7, Contest Limitations, when the team participated in more than 18 contests. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the number of summer contact days has been reduced from 13 to 10. **Lewis Center Olentangy Orange High School** did not comply with Bylaw 3-1, Administrative Responsibility and Institutional Control, when it did not conduct an appropriate inquiry when information arose concerning a possible violation of OHSAA Bylaws surrounding the participation of a football player during the 2025 season. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the OHSAA is issuing Olentangy Orange High School a monetary penalty of \$10,000. **Euclid Middle School** violated Track and Field Regulations C.2., Competition Prior to Season Start Date, and 1.10, Exhibition Competition, when the track and field team participated in an unscored meet prior to the March 27 start date. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the school's track and field team was not permitted to participate in the 2026 OHSAA 7th and 8th Grade State Championships. **Mentor Memorial Middle School** violated Track and Field Regulations C.2., Competition Prior to Season Start Date, and 1.10, Exhibition Competition, when the track and field team participated in an unscored meet prior to the March 27 start date. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, the school's track and field team was not permitted to participate in the 2026 OHSAA 7th and 8th Grade State Championships. **Cincinnati North College Hill High School** violated Bylaw 4-9-4 #10, Recruiting, by failing to submit the required documentation to refute the presumption of recruiting after multiple student-athletes transferred to the school following the hiring of their former coach. Under the bylaw, any student-athlete who transfers under these circumstances is presumed to have been recruited and is ineligible for one calendar year unless that presumption is successfully refuted through the required review process. Because the necessary paperwork was not submitted, the review process was never completed prior to two student-athletes competing in the 2026 track and field season. As a result, those two students competed while ineligible. Pursuant to Bylaw 10-2-5, Forfeitures, the ineligible students were removed from participation and all meets in which either athlete competed must be forfeited. Eligible participants will retain their

individual points, records, awards and qualifying positions. **Pataskala Liberty Christian Academy** had a student-athlete who was eligible to qualify for full eligibility, regarding the Scholarship Bylaw, under Bylaw 4-4-1 Exception 1, Sufficient Credit Exception. However, the school failed to submit the request for eligibility to the Executive Director's Office prior to the student participating in a regular season competition. The Executive Director's Office restored the student-athlete's eligibility retroactively and prospectively, but, in accordance with Bylaw 4-1-1, Administrative Error, the school was fined \$100. **Akron Archbishop Hoban High School** violated General Sports Regulation 4, Failure to Acquire a Pupil Activity Permit, when it permitted a student to sit in the coaches box at the 2026 state wrestling tournament without being properly credentialed as a coach. In accordance with Bylaw 11, Penalties, and the general sports regulation, the school has been fined \$400. **Batavia West Clermont High School** violated General Sport Regulation 11.2, Mandatory No-Contact Period, when the baseball coach supervised student-athletes participating in baseball-related activities during the no-contact period in August. The Executive Director's office accepted the school's self-imposed penalty of dismissal of the coach involved and the school is hereby publicly reprimanded for this violation.

Staff member Alexis Holderman provided the Board with an update on appeals. She said the OHSAA Appeals Panel has made 113 rulings on 105 appeals held during 19 hearings this school year, and 26 appeals were either granted or the penalties modified. Associate Executive Director Kristin Ronai also provided the Board with an update on current legislative issues. She said it's possible that, even though the membership just voted not to approve such a proposal for the third time, Senate Bill 276 will possibly be approved which will permit students at member public schools that do not offer a team sport to participate in that sport at another OHSAA member public school, with certain stipulations. In addition, OHSAA Legal Counsel Joe Fraley provided the Board with an update on current legal cases.

V. OLD BUSINESS

A. Recommendation to Approve Tournament Divisional Dividing Lines and Representation for Fall and Winter Sports

The Board was provided 2026 and 2027 tournament divisional dividing lines and representation for five fall sports; 2026 tournament divisional dividing lines and representation for the four fall Competitive Balance sports (divisional dividing lines only for football); 2027 and 2028 tournament divisional dividing lines and representation for five winter sports (representation only for gymnastics), and 2027 tournament divisional dividing lines and representation for the two winter competitive balance sports.

While the Board of Directors previously approved initial divisional dividing lines, the Executive Director's Office recommended that the Board approve the final school assignments to each division and representation since the deadline has passed for schools to request to move to Division I or to a higher division in those individual sports in which a school currently has one gender in a lower division, and it chooses to have them both compete in the higher of the two divisions. Of note, the following schools chose to move to Division I: **Girls Cross Country:** Rocky River Magnificat (from Division II); **Football:** Austintown-Fitch (from Division II); Clayton Northmont (from Division II); Cleveland Heights (from Division II); Dublin Scioto (from Division II); Elyria (from Division II); Euclid (from Division II); Hudson (from Division II), and Toledo St. John's Jesuit (from Division II); **Boys Soccer:** Elyria (from Division II), and Findlay (from Division II); **Girls Soccer:** Cuyahoga Falls Walsh Jesuit (from Division II); **Girls Volleyball:** Cincinnati St. Ursula Academy (from Division II); Cincinnati Seton (from Division II); Cincinnati Ursuline Academy (from Division II); Cincinnati Winton Woods (from Division II); Cleveland St. Joseph Academy (from Division II); Findlay (from Division II), and Loveland (from Division II); **Boys Basketball:** Cleveland Heights Lutheran East (from Division V); **Girls Basketball:** Cincinnati Mount Notre Dame (from Division II), and Rocky River Magnificat (from Division II), and **Boys Swimming and Diving:** Cuyahoga Falls Walsh Jesuit (from Division II).

A. Recommendation to Approve Reinstating Full Membership to Toledo Emmanuel Christian School

Staff member Alexis Holderman reported that Toledo Emmanuel Christian School has reapplied for full high school membership after going through the probationary period as required, has met the requirements and, therefore, it is recommended that the school be approved to be reinstated for full high school membership beginning with the 2026-27 school year.

It was noted that the school originally applied to be reinstated beginning with the 2026 spring sports season but was required to continue its probationary period to ensure it met the requirements.

B. Recommendation to Approve Girls Flag Football as an OHSAA Recognized Sport

Executive Director Doug Ute reminded the Board that the OHSAA worked with the National Football League, Pro Football Hall of Fame, Cleveland Browns, Cincinnati Bengals and Ohio High School Football Coaches Association to sponsor a girls flag football championship event during spring 2026. He said with the growth in the number of teams and participants both in Ohio and nationally and the success of the sponsored event this spring, he recommended that the Board approve recognizing girls flag football beginning with the 2026-27 school year. If approved, this would move the OHSAA to 29 recognized sports (15 for girls, 14 for boys). Mr. Ute said he anticipated the championship event will be held next spring at the Tom Benson Hall of Fame Stadium in Canton as it was in 2026.

- C. Recommendation to Approve Modifications to the 2026-27 Sport-by-Sport Regulations for OHSA Handbook
OHSA sport administrators reviewed proposed modifications to the sport-by-sport regulations that will appear in the 2026-27 OHSA Handbook after the staff collaborated on the proposed changes. The staff recommended that the modifications be approved by the Board. Most of the modifications reflect date changes or were made to provide clarity. Some key modifications: In **bowling**, a regulation was added that permits and specifies how bowlers with verifiable physical disabilities can participate in contests. In **gymnastics**, a regulation was added that permits student who have participated for the school team in the current season to gain permission from the Executive Director's Office to participate in two non-interscholastic contests/events, provided the participation does not violate any coach's, school, or school district/system policy. Other stipulations must also be followed. In **swimming and diving**, formal rules or parameters were added for junior varsity diving competition to establish clear, developmentally appropriate standards that support the expansion of high school diving statewide, without "dumbing down" the sport or compromising its established expectations. In **track and field**, a regulation was added to permit students who have participated for the school team in the current season to gain permission from the Executive Director's Office to participate in one non-interscholastic event as an individual or member of a team NOT representing or associated with an OHSA member school, provided the participation does not violate any coach's, school, or school district/system policy. Other stipulations must also be followed.

Motion by Ray Hibbs, second by Tom Nerl to **approve** modifications to the sport-by-sport regulations that will appear in the 2026-27 OHSA Handbook as presented.

It was noted that the football regulations were approved at the May 20, 2026, OHSA Board of Directors Meeting and that sport regulations for girls flag football will also be developed and published in the 2026-27 OHSA Handbook.

Motion passed 9-0.

- D. Recommendation to Approve 2026 Fall Sports Tournament Regulations
Updates in regulations for 2026 fall sport tournaments were provided to the Board by the OHSA's sport administrators, and the Executive Director's Office recommended that the modified regulations be approved. Most updates reflect date changes or modifications made for clarity purposes. In **football**, it was noted that the OHSA currently does not permit the use of drones during tournament contests, and a decision on whether to modify that regulation for the 2026 season has not been made. In **soccer**, it was noted that the official OHSA tournament ball has changed beginning with the 2026 season, and schools were notified of this change earlier this spring. In **girls volleyball**, it was noted that the exact schedule and site assignments for the state tournament have yet to be finalized, although all championship matches will continue to be held at Wright State University's Nutter Center.
