## • Let's Make Sporting Behavior A Priority

With the fall sports seasons upon us, administrators are reminded that making sporting behavior a priority during our contests and events must be a priority. Please remind your coaches, participants, student groups and parents that they represent the entire school community, and any unsporting actions are a poor reflection on everyone and defeat the purpose of interscholastic athletics, which are educational in nature. As a reminder, OHSAA Bylaw 3-2-1, School's Responsibility When Hosting A Contest, says the following:

"The host school has the responsibility to ensure that a contest or event is administered in a manner which emphasizes the educational values inherent in interscholastic athletics. It is the host school's responsibility to remove any individual(s) who disrupts the educational goals of the contest or event.

"Likewise, the host school is ultimately responsible for the safety of all participants (players, coaches, officials, spectators, etc.) in the interscholastic contest immediately before, during and immediately after each contest or event. Therefore, the host school shall appoint a site director/manager or administrator-in-charge for every contest or event. The host school shall ensure that the site director/manager or administrator-in-charge is aware of the school's emergency action plan and how to adjust it to meet the needs of the particular contest or event.

"Included in the emergency action plan shall be procedures to deal with emergencies, crowd management and health and safety protections. The plan shall also include procedures to ensure that unauthorized personnel are kept from the playing field; to provide safety and security for the visiting team(s), their spectators and the contest officials, and to provide safety and security for parking areas related to the contest or event. Penalties for violation of this bylaw shall be imposed by the Executive Director's Office as specified in Bylaw 11."

**About Coach Beyond:** In 2021, the OHSAA and LiFEsports at The Ohio State University started collaborative work to change the landscape of coach training and education in Ohio. Ultimately, this partnership grew into a statewide initiative known as Coach Beyond. Over the last four years, a team of coaches, athletic administrators, OHSAA administrators and LiFEsports leaders set out to audit coaching education, conduct a statewide needs assessment, design and pilot trainings and ultimately train 15,000 coaches by June 2024. ## No Contact Period in August

The mandatory no-contact period for coaches in the sports of baseball, lacrosse and softball began August 1, 2025, and lasts through August 31, 2025. The mandatory no-contact period in the sports of basketball and ice hockey began August 1, 2025, and lasts through August 24, 2025. Any coach, paid or volunteer, approved by the Board of Education to coach in those sports is prohibited from providing coaching or instruction during this time. This includes any type of tryouts in or out of school for purposes of non-interscholastic competition.
