## NEW ITEMS

### • State Basketball Tournaments Ticketing Information

Athletic administrators will be sent information on Wednesday, Jan. 28, about the digital ticketing purchase process for the state girls and boys basketball tournament through the OHSAA's digital ticketing partner, Hometown. The window for schools to order tickets will be open for a week prior to tickets going on sale to the general public.

Each OHSAA member school has access to purchase up to eight (8) Finals Package and Semifinals Package tickets for the girls state tournament AND eight (8) Finals Package and Semifinals Package tickets for the boys state tournament. Those eight tickets can be located together. Each school this week will be provided with ONE presale code that works for both girls and boys tournament tickets. Purchasers have the opportunity to click on and select their seats from a seat map of the University of Dayton Arena. Tickets for Wright State University's Nutter Center and Vandalia Butler High School are general admission. All-session ticket sales will end on Mar. 8 for the girls tournament and Mar. 15 for the boys tournament or until your school's pre-sale code has been used to purchase your eight (8) all-session tickets. Ticket Packages and center court club ticket sales for the public begin Wednesday, Feb. 11. Single-game tickets for the state finals go on sale Monday, Mar. 9 (girls) and Monday, Mar. 16 (boys).

The championship games for the 2026 state basketball tournaments will again all be held at the University of Dayton Arena, with the girls on Friday and Saturday, Mar. 13-14, and the boys on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Mar. 20-22. The girls state semifinals will be held Mar. 12-13 at either Dayton, Wright State or Butler, and the boys state semifinals will be held Mar. 19-21 at either Dayton or Wright State. ### • Board Approves Naming OHSAA State Track & Field Tournament after Jesse Owens

The state track & field tournament will now be named the OHSAA Jesse Owens State Track & Field Tournament. The OHSAA Board of Directors approved the Executive Director Office's recommendation for the change at its regularly scheduled meeting on Jan. 15, 2026. Besides recognizing the incomparable Owens, who demonstrated excellence, resilience, integrity

and courage throughout his lifetime, the move takes place as part of the Jesse Owens Initiative, "Beyond the Finish Line," an aligned effort with the Jesse Owens Foundation and The Ohio State University to resurrect the legacy of Owens, one of America's greatest heroes, empower the next generation and unite people from all backgrounds to pursue their highest potential. The OHSAA's state tournament, which expands to five from three divisions in 2026, will be held at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium on the campus of The Ohio State University in Columbus June 4-7.

Owens won nine OHSAA state track and field tournament events — including four as both a junior and senior in 1932 and 1933 — and set seven state records while competing for Cleveland East Tech High School. At the national interscholastic meet in Chicago during his senior year, he set a world record, tied a world record and set a national high school mark. Owens then enrolled at Ohio State, where on May 25, 1935, he performed one of the greatest feats in athletic history at the Big Ten Championships held in Ann Arbor, Mich. Uncertain that he would even participate after recently falling down a flight of steps, Owens set world records in the 220, 220 low hurdles and the long jump and tied the world mark in the 100, all in a span of about 45 minutes. In 1936, he qualified for the Olympic Games that were held in Nazi Germany and became the first American track & field athlete to capture four gold medals in a single Olympiad, winning the 100, 200, long jump and 4x100 relay. While showcasing his excellence on a global stage, his victories provided a powerful rebuke to Adolf Hitler's racist ideology, cementing his status as a legendary figure who symbolized perseverance and breaking barriers, with his achievements setting a standard for future generations of athletes. Owens died on March 31, 1980.

### • **OHSAA Scholarship Program Information To Be Emailed Next Tuesday**

Athletic administrators will be receiving information next Tuesday, Jan. 27 (and principals will be copied), on the process to begin nominating qualified senior student-athletes for an OHSAA Scholar-Athlete Scholarship. Each school may submit only one male, one female, one male ethnic minority and one female ethnic minority candidate for scholarship consideration. Recipients of any athletic scholarships (full or partial) in NCAA Division I or II institutions or appointees to military academies are not eligible. The on-line application process will include information being entered by a school administrator (principal or athletic administrator), the student and a school guidance counselor. To ensure that emails do not get trapped by firewalls/sent to a spam folder, this year's process will again include the school administrator emailing student candidates directly with the application information.

**IMPORTANT NOTE ON THE OHSAA SCHOLAR-ATHLETE PROGRAM:** Please note — and remind your students and parents — that the OHSAA has two (2) separate scholar-athlete recognition opportunities. Besides the Scholar-Athlete Scholarship Program outlined above, in which a \$1,000 monetary award is provided, each member high school has the opportunity to present a senior male and a senior female with an OHSAA Scholar-Athlete Award, a certificate which exemplifies the commitment to academic excellence while participating in interscholastic athletics and is generally presented during the school's senior assembly in the spring. While each honor is important, these awards are different since not every member school will have a scholar-athlete scholarship recipient, but each school has the opportunity to present two OHSAA Scholar-Athlete Awards.

**About Coach Beyond:** In 2021, the OHSAA and LiFEsports at The Ohio State University started collaborative work to change the landscape of coach training and education in Ohio. Ultimately, this partnership grew into a statewide initiative known as Coach Beyond. Over the last four years, a team of coaches, athletic administrators, OHSAA administrators and LiFEsports leaders set out to audit coaching education, conduct a statewide needs assessment, design and pilot trainings and ultimately train 15,000 coaches by June 2024. That training of coaches, which goes beyond the X's and O's, has exceeded that goal and we have reached over 52,000 coaches in Ohio.
