September 5, 2024, OHSAA Appeals

The OHSAA Appeals Panel met with appellants on September 5, 2024, virtually through Microsoft Teams. Appeals Panel members were Dr. Dale Fortner, former superintendent of Wadsworth City Schools; Dr. Michael Gallina, former superintendent of North Canton City Schools; Dr. Keith Bell, former superintendent of Euclid City Schools and Westerville City School District; and Mrs. Gina Franks, director of student services of Dover High School. Dr. Fortner served as the appeals hearing officer.

A. Bylaw 4-4-1, Scholarship, a 12th-Grade Student, Wooster High School (Northeast District)

A 12th grade student at Wooster High School did not pass five one-credit courses or the equivalent during the fourth grading period of the 2023-24 school year. The Executive Director's Office ruled that the student was ineligible for interscholastic athletics for the first grading period of the 2024-25 school year in accordance with Bylaw 4-4-1, Scholarship.

The student; the student's mother, Latoya Walker; and Wooster Principal, Scott Musser, appealed the ruling so that the student could be fully eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at Wooster High School.

There was a motion to **deny** the appeal.

Motion passed 3-o.

B. Bylaw 4-3-5, Semesters, a 12th-Grade Student, Cincinnati Miami Valley Christian Academy (Southwest District)

A 12th grade student exhausted their eight semesters of eligibility at the high school level during the 2023-24 school year. By operation of Bylaw 4-3-3, Semesters, the student is ineligible to compete at the high school level at any OHSAA member school, and specifically Cincinnati Miami Valley Christian Academy. The Executive Director's Office determined that the requirements of the exception to Bylaw 4-3-5 could not be met.

The student; the student's parents, Bob and Amy Herrlinger; and Miami Valley Christian Athletic Administrator, Matt Blandin, appealed the ruling so that the student could be fully eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at Miami Valley Christian Academy.

There was a motion to **deny** the appeal.

Motion passed 4-0.

C. Bylaw 4-4-1, Scholarship, a 12th-Grade Student, Zoarville Tuscarawas Valley High School (East District)

A 12th grade student at Zoarville Tuscarawas Valley High School did not pass five one-credit courses or the equivalent during the fourth grading period of the 2023-24 school year. The Executive Director's Office ruled that the student was ineligible for interscholastic athletics for the first grading period of the 2024-25 school year in accordance with Bylaw 4-4-1, Scholarship.

The student's Father, David Farnsworth and Tuscarawas Valley Athletic Administrator, Steve Franks, appealed the ruling so that the student could be fully eligible to participate in interscholastic athletics at Tuscarawas Valley High School.

There was a motion to **deny** the appeal.

Motion passed 3-0.
